An Interview with Mrs. Taranto, **Our New** Principal

For the Winter 2024 issue of The Academy Courier, I had the privilege and honor of interviewing Academy of the Holy Names principal, Mrs. Taranto. Although she is new to the principal's office, she is no stranger to the Holy Names community. Mrs. Taranto has taken on this very important role with grace and confidence. It has been my pleasure to get to know her better through this interview.

I: What was your life like before Holy Names? Where did you go to school, and did you have any teaching positions prior to here?

MT: I went to Hamilton College, and I majored in math, but I didn't know what I wanted to do after I graduated. I applied to both private school math teaching positions, and to law firms, because I wasn't sure if I wanted to be a lawyer, or a teacher. I figured I'd take whatever job I got first. I accepted a position at a huge law firm in Boston as the bankruptcy paralegal, and I hated it. Meanwhile, while I was there, a private school reached out in the Boston area and hired me to teach math for a maternity leave position. I took



that job and decided to get my Master's in Teaching at Harvard University. I taught at that school in Boston for two years, and when my husband and I moved back here; I taught very briefly at Albany Academy for Girls. Then, I had my first child, and the reality of motherhood set in, and I took a seventeen-year maternity leave from teaching. When my first born was a senior in high school, I was hired at Holy Names.

I: You taught middle school math and statistics here before becoming principal. Has math always been your strong suit?

MT: Yes, math was always my strong suit. When I went to college I thought I was going to be a psychology major, but then I had an amazing statistics professor, Professor Kelly. He was so exuberant, and just loved math, which I thought was pretty cool. This experience made me want to become a math major.


Four-legged Be


Traditions at Holy Names




My Time at the Rafael Nadal Academy
